

Hegel's Lectures in Critical Edition

Felix Meiner Verlag announce the publication of a series of texts of Hegel's lectures, prepared by experts in relevant fields of Hegelian scholarship. The edition can be regarded as a step towards the definitive historico-critical edition of the lectures within the <u>Collected Works</u> being prepared by the Hegel Archive in Bochum and published by the Felix Meiner Verlag.

The lectures so far chosen for publication are as follows:

Lectures on the History of Philosophy, vol. I: The Concept of Religion, ed. Walter Jaeschke.

Lectures on the Philosophy of Art (Hotho's transcript of 1823), ed. Annemarie Gethmann-Siefert.

Lectures on the History of Philosophy, vol. IV: Philosophy of the Middle Ages and the Modern Era (1825/26), eds. Pierre Garniron and Walter Jaeschke.

Lectures on Logic and Metaphysics (transcript of Karl Hegel 1831), eds. Hans-Christian Lucas and Udo Rameil.

The last volume in the series will be the lectures on natural law and political science, delivered by Hegel in the winter semester 1817/18 at Heidelberg University, described above.
