

THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE EGYPTIAN TOMB down to the Accession of Cheops

This book (meant for the use of practical archaeologists) is the first of a series, of which the second and third will deal with the Giza Necropolis and the Giza Mastabas, and forms a detailed introduction to the second volume. After discussing the prototypes of Egyptian tombs, the author describes in the greatest detail the tomb types of Dynasty I (First and Second Parts), the subsidiary graves at Abydos; the tomb types of Dynasties II and III; the Royal pyramidal tombs of early Dynasty IV; the mastaba and the substructure of private tombs of the reign of Sneferuw; the development of the superstructures of private tombs, Dynasties I-III, and Sneferuw; and the reconstruction of the royal superstructures of Dynasties I-II. He then reviews the development of the Egyptian tomb in this period. There are three appendixes, including unpublished graves from four sites, and the topographies of two cemeteries.
