## PLS and Comparative Public Policy

This issue of Politics and the Life Sciences features an international roundtable on the subject of secrecy and openness in donor insemination. The focus article, by Ken Daniels and Karyn Taylor of New Zealand, includes a number of cross-national comparisons of public policy in this area. To provide comments on this article, and to expand on the comparative perspective, the editor invited commentaries from experts in a number of different countries. Commentaries from six different countries made this a truly international roundtable. Since PLS is an especially good forum for such international discussions of public policy, the editor encourages submission of comparative public policy analyses in all of the fields relevant to PLS's mission. In the interest of generating cross-national dialogue and stimulating creative solutions to shared problems, the journal will, whenever feasible, employ an international roundtable format for such articles.

### **Conference on Threatened Coastal Seas**

An international conference on Environmental Management of Enclosed Coastal Seas (EMECS 93) will be held November 10-13 in Baltimore, Maryland, USA, on the shores of Chesapeake Bay. The site was chosen in part because Chesapeake Bay has become something of a model of coastal seas management. The conference will compare management in the Chesapeake region with other efforts world-wide.
