Did any serious policy underlie the barbed wit and political propaganda of Aristophanes? This discussion is centred upon the *Lysistrata*, where a more positive indication of the serious views of the great comic poet of Athens is found to obtrude into the funny business of his farce. Explanation and corroboration are drawn from many passages in his other plays. This essay offers a complete examination of a document which has never before been adequately explored as a source for the political history of fifth-century Athens, and is a reasoned synopsis of Aristophanes' random but pointed utterances.
