#### JAMES WILLARD HURST

October 6, 1910 – June 18, 1997

News of the death of Willard Hurst reached the *Law and History Review* as this issue was going to press. Few American scholars, whether lawyers or historians—or both—would contest the *New York Times*' description of Willard Hurst as "the dean of American legal historians" (20 June 1997). But Hurst's name is known to legal historians the world over, for in our field he was assuredly one of the giants of the twentieth century, his intellectual influence reaching well beyond the continental United States, his civility and scholarly generosity earning him the respect and affection of all who encountered him.

Obituaries have already appeared to mark Hurst's death. For a scholarly journal, however, it seems most appropriate to honor a great scholar not with ceremonies of passing but with signs of continuing engagement. The *Law and History Review* will therefore plan to devote a future issue to Willard Hurst as legal historian, his work and its impact.
