What Animal Is It? By R. Bigalke. The Trustees of the South Africa Bird Book Fund and the Mammals of South Africa Book Fund. Distributors J. L. van Schaik, P.O. Box 724, Pretoria, 7s. 6d.

There are too few books of a handy size on the fauna and flora of South Africa. Dr. Bigalke's little volume therefore fills a gap, being of moderate pocket size, written in a simple informative style, and to some extent covering the birds and trees of the Kruger National Park as well as the mammals. Space is also devoted to the three reptiles most likely to be seen by the tourist, the African crocodile, the python, and the water monitor.

Besides describing the main mammals and birds of the Park the author gives interesting information on their habits. Useful notes for the novice on the identification of antelopes are included, and suggestions made on books for further reading.

Dr. Bigalke has based this work on his earlier book A Guide to Some Animals of the Kruger National Park. The publishers and Mr. John Voelcker are to be congratulated on this useful addition to the bibliography of fauna.
