CONTRIBUTORS

DICKSON EYOH is Associate Professor of Political Science and African Studies at the University of Toronto, where he is also Director of the African Studies Program.

CYPRIAN FISY is a senior social scientist and leader of the Social Development Team in the Africa Region of the World Bank. His publications include 'Le monopole juridictionnel de l'Etat et le règlement des affaires de sorcellerie au Cameroun' in *Politique Africaine* (1990) and *Power and Privilege in the Administration of Law: differential responses to land tenure in Cameroon* (1992).

PETER GESCHIERE is Professor of African Anthropology at the University of Leiden. In 1997 he published *The Modernity of Witchcraft: politics and the occult in postcolonial Africa*; his essay 'Of witch doctors and spin doctors: the role of hidden expertise in African and American politics' is to appear shortly.

MITZI GOHEEN is Professor of Anthropology at Amherst College and co-editor of the *African Studies Review*. Over the last twenty years she has written extensively about Nso'; her most recent book is *Men own the fields, women the crops: gender and power in highland Cameroon* (1996, 1998).

JOSEF GUGLER is Professor of Sociology at the University of Connecticut. Among his publications are the edited *The Urban Transformation of the Developing World* (1996) and *Cities in the Developing World: issues, theory, and policy* (1997).

FRANCIS NYAMNJOH is head of the Department of Sociology and Anthropology at the University of Buea in Cameroon. His doctorate from the University of Leicester was on media and nation-building in Cameroon: in 1996 he published *The Cameroon GCE Crisis: a test of anglophone solidarity* and, in 1995, *The Disillusioned African*.

MICHAEL ROWLANDS is Professor of Anthropology at University College London. In recent years he has co-edited *Domination and Resistance* (1989; 1995) and co-authored (with K. Kristiansen) *Complexities of Social Transformation* (1998).

JOSÉ C. M. VAN SANTEN is Lecturer in Cultural Anthropology and Gender Studies at the University of Leiden. Her book on Mafa women and conversion to Islam was published in 1993 as *They Leave their Jars Behind*. She is continuing field research in northern ethnic identity, with the focus on aspects of Islamic fundamentalism.

LILLIAN TRAGER is Professor of Anthropology at the University of Wisconsin—Parkside, where she is also the Director of the Center for International Studies. She has carried out research into migration and rural-urban linkages in both the Philippines and Nigeria; she is writing a book on the role, in a number of Yoruba communities, of home-town connections in local development.

DAVID WILLIAMS is the Hedley Bull and Talbot Junior Research Fellow in International Relations, Lady Margaret Hall, Oxford.
