Cover photograph: The East Asian-Australasian Flyway supports the greatest diversity and populations of migratory birds globally, as well as the highest number of threatened migratory species of any flyway. It is also one of the most poorly understood migration systems and little is known about the populations and ecology of the passerine migrants that breed, stop over and winter in the habitats along this flyway.
