M BANTON and J HARWOOD
160pp, 3 illustrations £4.50

In this important new study, a sociologist and a biologist join forces to present a concise yet intelligible discussion of the biological concept of 'race'. The book is aimed at students in the upper forms of secondary schools and in colleges and universities as well as at all who are interested in an objective approach to this emotive topic. After tracing the development of ideas about race from the eighteenth century to the controversies which they still generate, the scientific underpinnings of racial characteristics are examined. The book ends with a discussion of the political implications of racial characteristics.
