

**Peter Ramsay, M.A., B.Sc.**

PETER RAMSAY, M.A., B.Sc., was graduate of Glasgow University. He obtained the degree of M.A. with First Class Honours in Mathematics and Natural Philosophy in the year 1900. In October of that year he was appointed to the staff of Allan Glen's School, Glasgow. He continued, however, to prosecute his University studies, and graduated as B.Sc. in 1904, with special distinction in the subjects above mentioned.

In 1908 he was appointed Second Mathematical Master in George Watson's Boys' College, Edinburgh, and later, in 1914, was promoted to the post of Head of the Mathematical Department in the same school.

Mr Ramsay's skill as a teacher was of an unusually high order, and he combined with it a natural bent for organisation, which made his service in the general administration of the school very valuable. At the time of his death he was acting as Deputy Headmaster of the School.

For three years he was Honorary Secretary of the Edinburgh Mathematical Society, and later was elected to the position of President of the same organisation.

He was elected a Fellow of this Society in 1914, and died suddenly on Friday, 2nd July 1926.
