C.P.A. ANNUAL CONFERENCE 1971

The fifteenth annual conference of the Canadian Philosophical Association will be held in June 1971 at Memorial University, St. John's, Newfoundland. Professor David Braybrooke, Department of Philosophy, Dalhousie University, Halifax, N.S. will act as chairman of the programme committee; members who wish to submit papers for the committee's consideration should get in touch with him, if possible enclosing abstracts.

ATLANTIC REGIONAL CONFERENCE:

On April 10 and 11 the President of the Canadian Philosophical Association and the philosophy departments of St. Mary's and Dalhousie, with the generous support of the Canada Council, initiated the first Atlantic regional conference of the C.P.A. at St. Mary's University, Halifax, Nova Scotia. Papers were presented by Professors C. Welch (Mount Allison), D. Braybrooke (Dalhousie), R. Gruner (St. Mary's), and E. Schaper (Glasgow), the titles of which respectively were Extra-Ordinary Language, The Logic of the Succession of Cultures, The Value of History and Evaluations within History, and Are Transcendental Deductions Impossible?. An organisational meeting, chaired by Professor F. H. Page (Dalhousie), tentatively outlined the aim, conditions of membership, method of selecting an executive annually, and the table of contents of a bi-annual news letter. The Université de Moncton has accepted the responsibility of convening and hosting the conference for 1970-71; St. Francis Xavier jointly with Xavier College for 1971-72; and the University of New Brunswick jointly with St. Thomas University for 1972-73.
