The preferred length of article is between <u>9,000 and 12,000</u> <u>words</u>, inclusive of footnotes. Articles which exceed or fall short of this length will be considered only at the Editor's discretion. The articles must be oriented toward a readership composed of scholars working in various disciplines, but written to be accessible to non-specialists.

Materials should be fully documented and have enduring value. Analyses of current affairs that may quickly fall out of date, and pieces containing policy prescriptions, are rarely accepted.

Before a manuscript can be published, it must conform to the Journal's style sheet, which is available upon request from the editor or at http://www.fas.nus.edu.sg/hist/doc/jseas. stylesheet.pdf.

Submission of an article will be taken to mean that it has not been previously published and that it is not on offer to any other publisher. Authors receive a complimentary copy of the issue of the Journal in which their piece appears and a PDF offprint file.
