All contributions in the journal are double-blind peer-reviewed. All manuscripts must entail original, previously unpublished work, and should not be under consideration for publication elsewhere. The Editors will also consider revised versions of previously released working papers, provided that such publication is clearly acknowledged upon submission of the paper for consideration to *TEL*.

TEL strives to respect an expedient turn-around time of 6-8 weeks between receipt of the manuscript and first notification of acceptance, rejection or need for revision.

The length of manuscripts should normally range between 8,000 and 11,000 words (including footnotes) for full-length articles; 3,000–6,000 words for commentaries and case notes; and 800–1,500 words for book reviews. Exceptionally, shorter or longer works may be considered at the Editors' discretion.
