



Film Directors is an extraordinarily rich source-book on the careers and individual films of twenty-three of the world's most important directors. It surveys the full range of critical perspectives in more than eighty selections. Some pieces cover entire careers or highlights-Michael Wood on Buñuel, Braudy on Renoir, Pechter on Ford—while others treat a representative film-Sontag on Persona, Kael on Shoot the Piano Player and Jules and Jim. A number of essays deal with particular directors in light of a specific aesthetic theory, for example, Christian Metz on "Mirror Construction in Fellini's 81/2." The editors have also included statements by directors on the work of other filmmakers—Bunuel on Lang, Ray on Renoir, Rivette on Hawks.

COMEDY HIGH AND LOW

An Introduction to the Experience of Comedy MAURICE CHARNEY, Rutgers University. Comedy High and Low is a lively exploration of the nature of comedy. In his own teaching Professor Charney has discovered how difficult it is to talk about comedy, which, unlike tragedy, has no common vocabulary, nothing comparable to "tragic flaw," "pity and fear," or "catharsis." He considers fundamental questions in his search for a mode of critical discourse: "Why is something comic? What are the comic conventions? How does the author elicit laughter, and to what purpose? Comedy High and Low seeks to bridge the gap between comic literature, especially stage comedy, and the popular comedy of jokes, graffiti, and the comic happenings of daily life. With examples taken from major figures of stage comedy, from Aristophanes to Stoppard, it brings an historical perspective to the subject. An extensive critical bibliography supplements this provocative and highly readable book.
