WHOLE-TIME COURSES FOR POST-GRADUATE STUDENTS

17 FEBRUARY TO 24 MAY, 1975, and 4 AUGUST TO 8 NOVEMBER, 1975
BASIC SCIENCES CLASS for Part I D.L.O. students.

This consists of approximately 50 lecture/demonstrations on the anatomy of the head, neck, thorax and brain; 20 lectures covering the physiological aspects; 6 on applied pharmacology; and 8 on histological and pathological and bacteriological subjects. Facilities are also available for dissection of the relevant parts, and this occupies abour 120 hours.

17 February to 15 March, 1975, and 4 August to 30 August, 1975
Basic Sciences Class for Students of Neurology.

This course includes 20 lectures on the anatomy of the brain, spinal cord and motor tracts, 6 lectures on the physiological properties, and 5 periods of dissection of the brain.

6 January to 15 February, 1975, and 23 Jrne to 2 August, 1975
Intensive Clinical Lecture Period for Post-Primary Fellowship,
Part II D.L.O. and other students.

These periods are primarily designed to give a clinical survey of the whole field of the Specialty as a preliminary to practical clinical training. At the completion of the Intensive Lecture Period, selected students may be given the opportunity to serve as house surgeons in the associated hospitals.

19 May to 31 May, 1975, and 29 October to 11 November, 1975
PRACTICAL REVISION CLASS for Part II D.L.O. students

This is intended for those students who are well advanced in preparation for the examination and need only the opportunity for a final review. The class includes demonstrations of selected clinical cases and *viva voce* examinations.

7 April to 19 April, 1975, and 22 September to 4 October, 1975
Advanced Revision Course for students taking higher surgical examinations.

This is limited to senior students who are about to take the Final examination. In addition to a series of lecture/discussions at the appropriate level in the

Specialty and in related branches of general surgery, there are a number of clinical and *viva voce* sessions and arrangements for the setting and correction of test papers.

A copy of the syllabus giving full information about the teaching and research facilities provided by the Institute, and a detailed programme of any of the courses listed overleaf and of the short courses on specific aspects which are arranged from time to time can be obtained from the Secretary-Administrator.

The clinical practice can be joined at any time by individual arrangement with the Dean. This includes daily practical teaching in the clinics and operating theatres and ward-rounds and special demonstrations weekly.

Demonstrations of clinical cases, open clinical lectures and clinical pathological conferences are held at regular intervals throughout the year, and are open without fee to all trainees in the Specialty. A list giving dates and times is obtainable in the Secretary-Administrator's office.

COURSE IN NEUROTOLOGY

MARCH 24 THROUGH 27, 1975

The Department of Otolaryngology of the Abraham Lincoln School of Medicine and the University of Illinois Hospital Eye and Ear Infirmary, University of Illinois, at the Medical Center, will conduct a continuing education course in Neurotology, March 24 through 27, 1975. This four day intensive course will offer a didactic and practical review of clinical neurotology under the direction of Nicholas Torok, M.D. It will be held at the Eye and Ear Infirmary and will include basic vestibular physiology and pathophysiology, commonly used testing methods applied in functional examination of the vestibular organ.

In addition, various forms of caloric testing procedures will be demonstrated using nystagmography, reading and evaluation of the test results, particularly the nystagmogram, and correlation with audiometric and neurologic findings, final neurotological diagnosis, management and treatment. Patients will be tested by participants and the history, symptoms and test results will be discussed in informal conferences.
