

## THE STRUCTURE OF MATERIAL SYSTEMS: ETHNOARCHAEOLOGY IN THE MAYA HIGHLANDS

This contribution of the Coxoh Ethnoarchaeology Project focuses on three communities in high-land Guatemala: Chanal and San Mateo Ixtatan, both of which are "traditional" settlements, and Aguatenango, with strong regional economic ties but relatively traditional social institutions. Hayden and Cannon's objective was to acquire quantitative documentation for a series of material variables that are commonly used by archaeologists to infer social structural parameters, and then determine the degree to which correlations actually obtain between these variables and the social structural parameters in an ethnographic setting. They also examine these relationships at different scales, from household to community.
