Authors submit manuscripts to the editor for consideration as ARTICLES or REPORTS in English, Spanish, or Portuguese. *Latin American Antiquity* has a fixed limit of 10,000 words for ARTICLES and 3,000 words for REPORTS. Tables and illustrations should be limited to those that are appropriate and necessary. Authors are required to submit manuscripts electronically through Editorial Manager® (<http://www.editorialmanager.com/laq>).
