THE NEWBERRY LIBRARY HAS ANNOUNCED FELLOWSHIPS IN THE HUMAN-ITIES FOR 1982-1983, as listed below, in any field appropriate to the Library's collections. For further information write to: Committee on Awards, The Newberry Library, 60 West Walton Street, Chicago, Illinois 60610.

Short-Term Resident Fellowships for Individual Research. The stipend is \$600 per month for a maximum of three months. Applicants must have completed the Ph.D. or be at the dissertation stage. Preference will be given to applicants who particularly need the Newberry's resources and to those from outside the Chicago area. Completed applications are due March 1 or October 15, 1982.

Exxon Education Foundation Fellowships. One six-month fellowship with stipend of \$8,500 and up to ten shorter-term fellowships (for a maximum of three months) with stipends of \$600 per month are offered for work in residence at the Newberry. Applicants must be post-doctoral scholars at an early stage of their professional careers. Completed applications are due March 1, 1982.

Ford Foundation Fellowship for Minorities. One eleven-month fellowship is offered to a Black, Mexican/Chicano, Puerto Rican, or Native American scholar for post-doctoral research in residence at the Library. The stipend is up to \$18,000, depending on salary, and the successful applicant will also be eligible for up to \$2,000 in supplementary funds for such costs as travel, typing, etc. Preference will be given to applicants at an early stage of their professional careers. Completed applications are due March 1, 1982.

Monticello College Foundation Fellowship for Women. A six-month fellowship for work in residence by a woman scholar with the Ph.D. carries a stipend of \$7,500 and is designed primarily for women at an early stage of their professional careers. Preference will be given to applicants whose scholarship is particularly concerned with the study of women. Completed applications are due March 1, 1982.

Resident Fellowships for Unaffiliated Scholars. Stipends of \$250 per calendar quarter are available to scholars who have the Ph.D. but who are not professionally employed in their field. Applicants must propose to use the Newberry as a scholarly base and be working on a specific project in a field appropriate to the Library's resources. Scholars must spend 6–8 hours a week in residence and participate in

the intellectual life of the Library. Stipends may be renewed quarterly up to one year, and afterward fellowship status may be renewed annually but without stipend. Completed applications are due March 1, or October 15, 1982.

Newberry-British Academy Fellowship for Study in Great Britain. In cooperation with the British Academy, the Newberry Library offers an exchange fellowship for three months' study in Great Britain in any field of the humanities in which the Newberry's collections are strong. Preference will be given to established scholars on the staffs of universities, museums, or libraries, and especially to readers and staff of the Newberry. The stipend is £12 per day in Great Britain with the Fellow's home institution expected to continue a regular salary. Completed applications are due March 1, 1982.

THE 421ST ANNIVERSARY OF THE BIRTH OF FRANCIS BACON was observed at the Francis Bacon Library of the Claremont Colleges on January 22, 1982.
