## ALEX SIMIRENKO (1931-1979)

Alex Simirenko, Professor of Sociology at The Pennsylvania State University, died April 27, 1979, after a long illness.

Born in Kiev, Ukraine, in 1931, Alex came from an illustrious family, descended from Zaporozhian Cossacks. Members of the Simirenko family were known for their contributions to science and technological development; their patronage of the arts, including sponsorship of the work of Taras Shevchenko; and their committment to social reform and Ukrainian independence.

After fleeing the Soviet Union, Dr. Simirenko attended the Ukrainian school in Prague and completed his secondary education in Augsburg, Bavaria. Coming to the United States in 1950, he attended the University of Minnesota where he received the BA, MA, and PhD, all in sociology.

He taught at the University of Nevada, Reno and the California State University at Northridge before joining the Penn State faculty in 1969.

Dr. Simirenko was a member of many professional societies, including ASN since its founding, reflecting his interest in both sociology and Slavic studies. He was active in the organizational and administrative work of these associations, and also served on the editorial boards of several professional journals.

He was the author of numerous articles, book reviews, and professional papers. He was the author or editor of three books: PILGRIMS, COL-ONISTS, AND FRONTIERSMEN: AN ETHNIC COMMUNITY IN TRANSITION (1964), a study of the Carpathian community in Minneapolis; SOVIET SOCIOLOGY: HISTORY, ANTECEDENTS, AND CURRENT APPRAISALS (1966); and SOCIAL THOUGHT IN THE SOVIET UNION (1969). At the time of his death, he was working on a survey research study of the ethnic identity of Polish-American students.

Association for the Study of the Nationalities mourns and honors a prolific scholar, an excellent teacher, and a friendly human being.

4. To provide N.P. with a solid financial base through life-memberships, donations from members and friends, and subsidies from foundations and benevolent organizations.

5. To make it possible for the ASN to organize its own national and international meetings aimed at the promotion of research and interest in non-Russian nationalities of the USSR and various national minorities populating the countries of Eastern Europe.

6. To establish close cooperation with institutions, associations, and organizations sharing common interest and activities.

7. Finally, to convince members of the ASN that the above goals are indeed within our reach provided, of course, that each one is willing to secure at least one new member, one additional subscription, and send a generous check to our Secretary-Treasurer, Professor Andris Skreija.

The past successes — and they were numerous indeed — are the best testimony to our collective ability to continue to move forward.
