BREWER PRIZE CONTEST, 1955

There must be two copies, a typescript and a first carbon, on standard weight paper, double-spaced, with a left-hand margin of at least an inch and one-half.

Mr. Bundy, the noted Biblical scholar, is Professor of Bible at DePauw University, and is the author of many important books in the Biblical field.
