#### THE ASSOCIATION

The American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies is an international organization of persons interested in the Slavic and East European field. Regular memberships are \$12.00 per year; sustaining memberships are \$25.00 per year. A student membership (without vote) at \$6.00 per year is available to full-time students with U.S. mailing addresses. Students outside the United States, as well as students with teaching assistantships or part-time jobs, may join as regular members. There are also nonvoting associate memberships at \$12.00 per year. Joint memberships are available for a married couple both of whom wish to join the Association but who need only one copy of the publications; both names will be listed, but the fee and voting rights are those of a single membership. The membership dues for emeritus members are \$6.00.

All classes of membership receive the quarterly Slavic Review; the American Bibliography of Slavic and East European Studies (regular price \$3.50), now published by the Ohio State University; the Association's Newsletter (price \$1.50 per year in the United States, \$1.80 abroad), published regularly at the Ohio State University; and the Directory of the Association (sold to nonmembers at \$5.00) in the years when it is published. ### INSTITUTIONAL DEVELOPMENTS

The Office of External Research of the Department of State in July 1968 discontinued its listings of individual academic foreign area research projects in progress. In 1952, when the "External Research Lists" were begun, a critical information need faced those scholars embarking on foreign area research. Today many interdisciplinary associations compile and disseminate information about research in their specific areas-for example, the AAASS-sponsored American Bibliography of Slavic and East European Studies. Lists of dissertation topics proposed or completed, a proliferation of new periodicals that often list research in progress, and other bibliographic and abstracting services now fill the former void.

In place of the "External Research Lists" the Department of State is now emphasizing expansion of its Foreign Affairs Research Documentation Center, which was created in 1965. The center is intended to provide for State Department and other government officers a repository for the findings of research by the academic community that pertain to foreign relations and foreign areas. Requests from government personnel for copies of these research papers have increased considerably. Requests from persons outside the government are referred to the author or sponsoring agency.

Scholars and research institutes that have prepared appropriate papers for academic and professional meetings or have completed other unpublished studies are invited to send copies to: FAR Documentation Center, Office of External Research, Room 8642, Department of State, Washington, D.C. 20520.

The Research Centre for Canadian Ethnic Studies has been founded at the University of Calgary with the purpose "to stimulate, promote, coordinate, and conduct research on all Canadian ethnic groups, and

in doing so, to contribute to the development of the multicultural nature of the Canadian identity." The center publishes a semiannual journal called *Canadian Ethnic* Studies, subscriptions \$4.00 per year.

## Professional Placement Register

The staffing of academic vacancies has become an increasingly complex and timeconsuming process for all concerned. Consequently, beginning with the fall issue, the Newsletter of the American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies has inaugurated a Professional Placement Register as a service to its membership. Memare asked to encourage their institutions to list vacancies in Slavic and East European area studies in the fields of anthropology, economics, geography, history, Slavic languages and literatures, law, politics and international relations, and sociology. The AAASS will make no charge to the institution for listing in the Register.

If, after a suitable trial period, the Newsletter finds that the response is inadequate, the Register will be discontinued. Although an initial mail solicitation of colleges and universities is being made, the success of this service venture will eventually rest upon the impetus provided by the members.

Institutions wishing to place notices of vacancies should write to the Professional Placement Register, American Association for the Advancement of Slavic Studies, Room 254, 190 West Nineteenth Avenue, The Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio 43210. Information should include fields of specialization required, rank, courses, hours, salary, and the name of the person to whom inquiries should be addressed. Each vacancy should be typed, double-spaced, on a separate sheet of paper (not in the body of the letter).

Applicants are instructed not to write to the offices of the AAASS but to correspond directly with the institution listed.
