OBJECTS

The British Institute of International and Comparative Law was founded in 1958 to provide a centre for research, discussion and publication on the practical application of public and private international law and comparative and EC law. It provides a forum where academic and practising lawyers can contribute to the development of the law and to its application to contemporary problems. It occupies modern central premises in Russell Square, London W.C.1, where it maintains a specialist staff and has access to a fine set of conference rooms, together with its own specialised library.

The Chairman of the Institute's Council of Management is The Rt. Hon. the Lord Goff of Chieveley. The programme of meetings and research is developed under the guidance of an Advisory Board which is divided into four sections: Public International Law (Chairman, H.E. Judge Rosalyn Higgins, DBE), Private International Law (Chairman, Lawrence Collins, LL.D., F.B.A.), Comparative Law (Chairman, Sir Robert Megarry) and EC Law (Chairman, The Rt. Hon. the Lord Slynn of Hadley). The work programme includes over sixty specialist meetings each year, ranging from practitioner workshops, conferences and courses to discussion groups and lectures.

PUBLICATIONS

The Institute publishes the *International and Comparative Law Quarterly*, the fortnightly *Bulletin of Legal Developments* and other books in each of the fields of the Institute's interests. The *ICLQ*, published four times each year (approximately 1000 pages), is a journal of unique coverage of public and private international law, and comparative law, with particular emphasis on European and Commonwealth law. The *BLD* provides an up-to-the-minute information service of developments in law including legislation, case law, law reform proposals and international conventions; each issue contains about 80 items of news and is digested by reference to the legal systems of Europe, the United Kingdom, the Commonwealth as well as the EC, and other international organisations.

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
