## NOTES ON THE CONTRIBUTORS

**BRIAN SMITH** is a Jesuit priest and a doctoral candidate in political science at Yale University. He is currently working at Centro Bellarmino in Santiago, Chile—a center for socioreligious research—and is writing his dissertation on the political impact of major developments in the Chilean Church from 1925 to 1975.

**HOWARD HANDELMAN** is Assistant Professor of Political Science at the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee and is a member of its Latin American Center. He is the author of *Struggle in the Andes: Peasant Political Mobilization in Peru* (1974) and is currently engaged in research on the Mexican working class.

**FREDERICK C. TURNER** is Professor of Political Science at the University of Connecticut. The author of *Responsible Parenthood: The Politics of Mexico's New Population Policies* (1974), he has been working more recently on Argentine politics with the assistance of grants from the National Science Foundation and the National Endowment for the Humanities.

**ALEJANDRA MORENO TOSCANO** is Professor of History at the INAH and at El Colegio de México. In addition to numerous articles in journals, she is the author of *Geografía económica de México (siglo XVI)* published in 1968. She has been conducting the urban history seminar for the last three years.

**JAMES R. SCOBIE** is Professor of History at the University of Indiana, Bloomington. He is the author of numerous works on Argentine history, including *The Revolution on the Pampas: A Social History of Argentine Wheat, 1860–1910* (1964) and, most recently, *Buenos Aires: Plaza to Suburb, 1870–1910* (1974).

**JOHN V. LOMBARDI** is Associate Professor of History at Indiana University, Bloomington, and codirector of the MUCIA-CENDES Caracas project. Among his many publications is *The Decline and Abolition of Negro Slavery in Venezuela, 1820–1854*, which has also appeared in translation.

**GERMÁN CARRERA DAMAS** is Professor of History in the Universidad Central de Venezuela and affiliated with the Centro de Estudios del Desarrollo. He is codirector of the MUCIA-CENDES Caracas project, and among his publications are *Sobre el significado socioeconómico de la acción histórica de Boves*, and *El culto a Bolívar*.

**RICARDO LAGOS**, a native of Chile, has taught economic development at the National University and, since 1972, has served as secretary general of the Latin American Faculty of Social Sciences (FLACSO). The author of numerous works on Chilean and hemispheric economics, he recently completed a year at the University of North Carolina and has accepted a UNESCO position in Buenos Aires.

**OSCAR A. RUFATT**, formerly with the Institute of Economics at the University of Chile, is currently with the Department of Economics, University of Pennsylvania.

**PATRICK J. LEONARD, C.S.SP.**, is a Catholic missionary priest. At present he is on the staff of the Instituto Pastoral de Adamantina in the State of São Paulo, Brazil.
