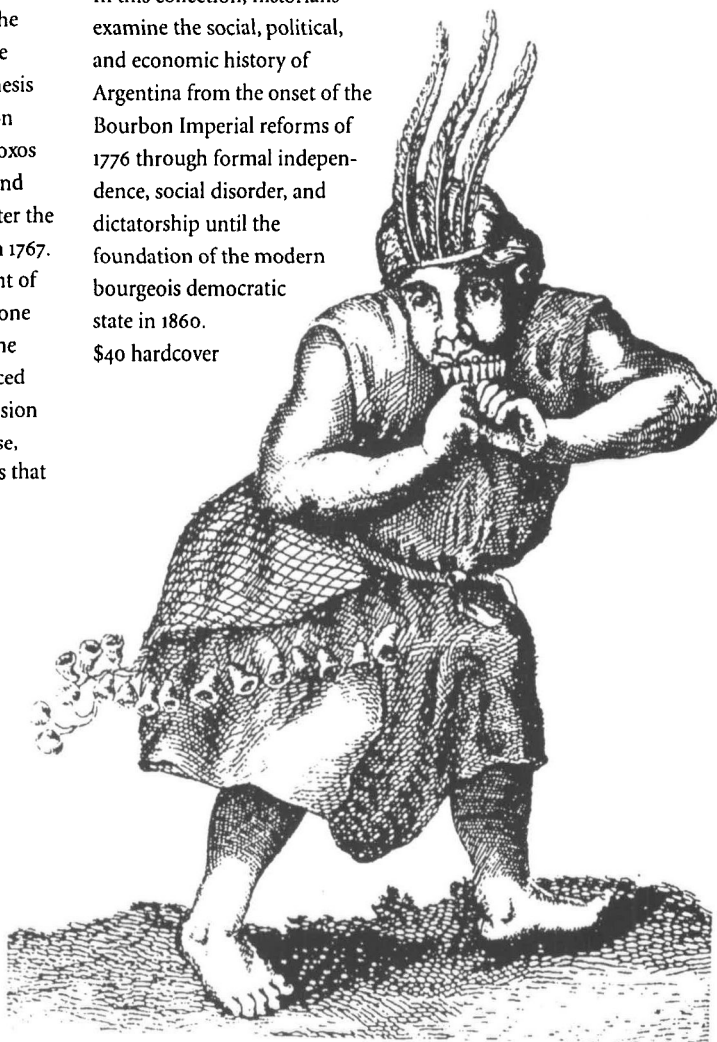

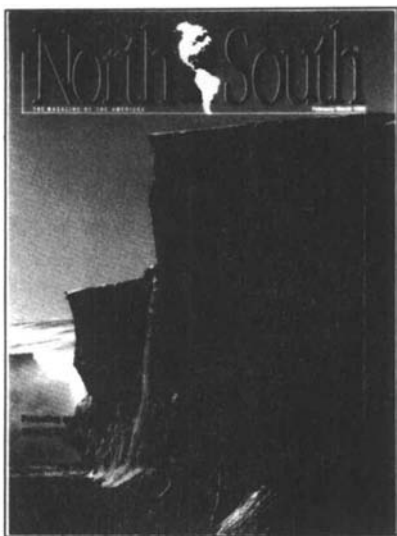

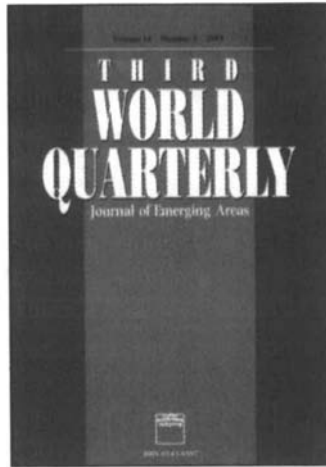

Tables, diagrams and maps may be included by arrangement with the editors. The Journal only publishes original contributions; translations of articles already published will not be accepted. Each contributor will receive, free of charge, 25 offprints of the article and a copy of the issue of the Journal in which it appears.

The Journal publishes book reviews in each issue. Not all books received can be reviewed and editorial policy gives preference to substantial reviews of books regarded as of major importance for the disciplines covered by the Journal.
