

EASTERN ARCTIC PREHISTORY: PALEOESKIMO PROBLEMS

Eastern Arctic Prehistory: Paleoeskimo Problems, Memoir 31 of the Society for American Archaeology, edited by Moreau S. Maxwell, is now available.

Because of the Arctic's environmental constraints and the necessarily limited scope of human biocultural adaptive response, much can be learned there about general cultural processes and systems, at least among hunters, from data not available in more temperate regions. But Arctic study by its nature tends to be isolative. Unlike their colleagues to the south, researchers cannot jump in a car and visit a site where a fellow archaeologist is recovering similar data, and the opportunity for intellectual interchange at meetings is all too short. Eastern Arctic Prehistory is the product of a unique opportunity for ten well-known "chapped-hand" archaeologists to steep themselves for a full week in joint discussion seeking understanding of the processes of human behavior through pursuit of those whom modern Inuit call Tunit.

Contributions by Robert McGhee, James A. Tuck, Guy Mary-Rousselière, Moreau S. Maxwell, Albert A. Dekin, Jr., William Fitzhugh, Elmer Harp, Jr., and Ronald J. Nash call into question "the whole temporal matrix on which we base our interpretations of change, contact, and diffusion," and the simplicity of a former model of culture contact between Dorset and Thule, suggest previously unsuspected nexi linking marginal peoples, and point interesting new directions for the pursuit of arctic prehistory.
