The lively ferment in Etruscan studies, generated in part by recent archaeological discoveries and fostered by new trends in interpretation, has produced a wealth of information about the people historians traditionally considered as inaccessible. Now scholars are reconstructing a portrait of the wealthy, sophisticated Etruscans whose territory once extended from the Bay of Naples to the Po River. 


