ENGLISH LITERARY RENAISSANCE is the title of a new journal to be published by the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. Focusing on the cultural and intellectual aspects of Tudor and Stuart literature, the journal will publish articles (4,000–7,500 words), monographs (8,000– 15,000 words), freshly edited texts of brief manuscripts and pamphlets, and annotated bibliographies. Manuscripts should conform to the MLA Style Sheet with footnotes appended only where necessary; publication will be in autumn, winter, and spring.

Galiani and Subsequent Economic Theorists,' by Giorgio Tagliacozzo (Marconi U, Voice of America).

Lebano (U of Wisconsin, Milwaukee); 'Dante's Ulysses and Guido da Montefeltro,' by Anna T. 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THE EXPLICATOR AWARD for the best book of explication de texte published in 1967 has been won by Paul J. Alpers (U of California, Berkeley) for *The Poetry of the Faerie Queene*, published by the Princeton University Press. Cited for honorable mention was Stanley Eugene Fish (U of California, Berkeley) for *Surprised by Sin: The Reader in Paradise Lost*, published by St. Martin's Press. The judges were Sheridan W. Baker (U of Michigan), Charles C. Walcutt (Queens C, CUNY), and William K. Wimsatt (Yale U).

THE JOURNAL OF THE CATCH SOCIETY OF AMERICA has just commenced publication. The Catch Society is devoted to increasing knowledge of and interest in the catch and related musical forms and in the popular culture of the sixteenth through the eighteenth centuries. THE MUSEO NAZIONALE OF PARMA held an exhibition of 171 fifteenth- and sixteenth-century paintings in the Stables of the Palazzo della Pilotta from January through March. The paintings, from the Museum's storerooms, included some well-known items, such as the twenty small sixteenth-century Flemish copies of portraits of the Farnese family. Others were new discoveries, such as the self-portrait of Parmigianino, hardly larger than a postcard. The period of these paintings is Parma's golden age, between Correggio and Annibale Carracci. Some frescoes from churches in Parma and its surroundings were also included.

The painting, which is in an excellent state of preservation, belonged to the Duke of Broglie in the nineteenth century. Its earlier history is unknown.
