Submission of Articles and Comment

The *Ecclesiastical Law Journal* covers all aspects of ecclesiastical law, with a particular emphasis on the legal regulation of the Church of England and the worldwide Anglican Communion. Its range of coverage also includes comparative studies of the laws of other faiths and of the interface between law and religion in United Kingdom jurisprudence and worldwide. General policy is developed by the Editor in collaboration with the Editorial Board.

The *Ecclesiastical Law Journal* is peer reviewed and operates (for submissions which have not been formally commissioned) an anonymous double blind refereeing process using members of the Editorial Board together with others expert in the particular field concerned. Authors should therefore take care not to identify themselves within the text of the manuscript which they submit. Articles should generally be between 7,000 and 10,000 words and Comment pieces should not usually exceed 6,000 words.
