

- 3) Where the manuscript has been developed in association with a specialized agency, trade union, or interest group, the publishers can arrange for "in association with" publication, in exchange for some financial support or help at the stage of preparation of printer's copy.
- 4) Where none of these possibilities obtain, individual authors should anticipate having to prepare camera-ready copy. Access to a superior typewriter or word processor will be an advantage. The Press will advise on the minimum acceptable standards.

Intending authors are advised in the first instance to send outlines (no manuscripts, please) to the Press Editor, Robert Molteno (who with his colleagues will be responsible for the final approval and contract) or the Series Editor, Robin Cohen, who will act as an advisor to the Press and to authors.

NEW JOURNAL - AFRICAN AGENDA

African Agenda is a new, quarterly magazine, published by the Revolutionary Publishing Cooperative (PO Box 4364, Accra, Ghana). According to the magazine's editor, Mukhtar Kablai Mustapha, African Agenda is a "vigorous, revolutionary and committed magazine", whose intention is to "construct a favourable base upon which to achieve, sustain and enlighten a radical people's revolution, presenting hard facts and analyses which do not appear in the largely colonized international media".
