Editorial policy The *Journal of the International Phonetic Association* is concerned with all aspects of the theory, description, and use of phonetics and phonology. Contributions are subject to review and to the Editor's final decision as to publication. The primary language of the *Journal* is English, though contributions in other languages of wide scholarly currency may be accepted. Contributions in English may use either British or American standard spelling and punctuation, consistently.

Submission of manuscripts Except for book reviews, all manuscripts should be submitted to John Esling, Editor of JIPA (esling@uvic.ca). Initially, submissions should be in a form that can be conveniently read by Editors and reviewers, and tables and figures should be included in the same document as the text. Papers may be submitted in hard copy triplicate, but electronically submitted PDF files, e-mailed as AuthorName.pdf attachments (e.g. Smith.pdf) or sent on disc, are preferable. An e-mail address is required for publication. Most standard word-processing formats (for either PC or Macintosh) are supported.
