Worship and Theology in England: The Ecumenical Century, 1900-1965

HORTON DAVIES

The Ecumenical Century is Volume V of Professor Horton Davies' great work, and the third to be published (following Volume III on 1690-1850 and Volume IV on 1850-1900). Dealing with a period notable both for its concern for Christian unity and also for liturgical and artistic experiment, it takes account of church architecture, music, and literature as well as the forms of worship in five traditions: Anglican, Free Church, Roman Catholic, Society of Friends, and Unitarian. Believing that 'the study of the cultus of the Christian Churches offers the deepest clue to their interior life', the author fully justifies his method and approach by a brilliant book, fascinating by its constant relevance to current concerns, which it shows in their historical and ecumenical relations.

From Pachomius to Ignatius

A Study in the Constitutional History of the Religious Orders
(*The Sarum Lectures* 1964-5)

The author surveys the evolution of the religious orders of the later middle ages and modern times from the beginnings of Christian monachism in Egypt. Pachomius, the first to organize a community of monks, anticipated many of the characteristics of a religious order, but the lesson had to be learnt again in the West, and St. Benedict, Cluny, Citeaux, St. Francis and above all St. Dominic mark some of the stages. The final stage is seen in Ignatius Loyola's foundation of the Society of Jesus. 106 pages 15s net

This volume replaces the one by W. L. Wardle in the original Clarendon Bible series but differs from it by carrying the narrative beyond the time of Ezra to the Maccabean Revolt, and in treating the history and religion together in chronological sequence, so as to encourage the student to see as a whole the developing life of Israel over the centuries.
