Institute of Latin American Studies Program NEH Grant

The National Endowment for the Humanities has offered support of up to \$68,449 to the Institute of Latin American Studies for conducting a program designed to expand instruction in Latin American Studies in schools, libraries and communities throughout Texas. Beginning in September, 1975, and extending through August, 1976, ILAS will conduct two conferences and a summer school designed primarily for educators interested in implementing or improving the teaching of Latin American Studies. This effort will be coordinated with the statewide program of bilingualbicultural education. The first conference will be aimed at educators at the supervisory and administrative level; the second conference, for librarians, community leaders, and junior colleges; and the summer school will be organized for teachers involved in Texas' bilingual-bicultural effort. Each conference will consist of intensive seminars and information sessions pertaining to Latin American Studies.

The year-long program hopes to accomplish four goals: First, the training of persons engaged in or preparing to engage in Latin American Studies in community schools and libraries throughout Texas; second, the collection and development of appropriate instructional and curriculum materials and other information related to Latin American Culture Studies; third dissemination and "institutional-ization" of this material through a publication and by training one or more "Latin American Studies and Area Specialists" to serve as resource people and consultants for other teachers in each Texas school district interested in Latin American Studies. Finally, it is hoped to establish, on the basis of this effort, a permanent "Resource Center Network" that will continue to carry out the goals of the program even after funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities has ended.
