

'Archaeology in Greece', compiled annually by the Director of the British School, is the only account of all recent archaeological work in Greece in the English language. It is supplemented each year by reports from other parts of the ancient Greek and Byzantine world: South Italy, Sicily, Sardinia, Cyprus, Asia Minor, the Black Sea and North Africa are covered regularly.

The content of the current issue departs somewhat from that announced in AR 1985-86: the last of Professor P. M. Warren's interim reports on the excavations at the Stratigraphical Museum in Knossos will now appear next year, in AR 1987-88, and Mr M. Loulloupis was unable to contribute his report on Archaeology in Cyprus. The editor is very much indebted to Mr D. J. Symons for stepping into the breach and compiling a Cyprus report at very short notice; also to Dr R. J. A. Wilson and Dr V. Karageorghis for their generous advice and assistance.

In addition to the Stratigraphical Museum report mentioned above, AR 1987-88 will contain reports on Southern Italy and Sardinia, by Mr D. Ridgway, and a report on Sicily, by Dr R. J. A. Wilson.

The illustration on the cover of this issue is of a gold necklace with a pendant and six spiral beads, found in Tomb 63 at Lefkandi Toumba.

In recent years the steadily increasing size of *Archaeological Reports* has given us steadily increasing difficulty in meeting printing costs. We are very grateful indeed to the LONDON HELLENIC SOCIETY, whose generous grant assisted the last issue (Volume 32, 1985–86) and to the A. G. LEVENTIS FOUNDATION, which has agreed to help us with the costs of future volumes.
