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## In Memoriam: Alexander D. Langmuir, Pioneer in the Epidemiologic Sciences

Dr. Alexander D. Langmuir died November 22, 1993 at his home in Baltimore. He was 83. Dr. Langmuir was founder of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Epidemic Intelligence Service (EIS), where he served as director for twenty years. The organization founded by Dr. Langmuir has been responsible for the training of 2,200 epidemiologists in the past 42 years. His development, promotion, and implementation of the concept of population based surveillance with rapid response to prompt diseases reporting

"...unveiled to the slowly awakening medical community the scientific vigor and utility of the epidemiologic method in public health" (Dr. Michael Gregg, *EIS Bulletin* December 1993.)

Preceding and subsequent to his career at the CDC, Dr. Langmuir taught at Johns Hopkins University, where he remained active until shortly before his death.
