The State Historical Society of Wisconsin will record an oral history of the United Packinghouse Workers of America (UPWA), as recounted by union members, with a grant of \$84,133.50 from the National Endowment for the Humanities. The UPWA was widely recognized as one of the nation's most progressive unions, committed to social equality, industrial democracy and racial desegregation in the workplace and in the community. The project will be to conduct interviews with seventy-five former and current union members to determine how well the progressive attitudes and policies of the union's national leadership were received and implemented at the local level. Under the direction of Society Archivist Jim Cavanaugh, some two hundred hours of interviews will be taped with union members scattered throughout the Midwest. Cavanaugh has directed several other oral history projects with labor themes for the Society. The interviews will be conducted by Rick Halpern and Roger Horowitz, who have both completed masters degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, with heavy emphasis on research involving the UPWA. The interviews will enrich the documentation provided by the Society's existing collection of 600 boxes of UPWA archival material. Project interviewers can be reached at 608-262-5645.

The Connecticut State Library has begun a two-year Judicial Records Survey and Planning Project. Its purpose is to assemble data about historical judicial records in the State Library, offices of clerks of state courts, including probate courts, and offices of town clerks in order to improve researcher access and to make preliminary recommendations for long-term archival preservation. Project personnel will conduct on-site surveys of pre-1900 court records in the twelve Superior Courts and twenty-one Geographical Area courts, they will contact all town clerks and probate clerks to gather data, and they will conduct a survey of approximately eight thousand cubic feet of judicial records in the State Library Archives.
