# MANUSCRIPT FLOW

Between July 1, 1976, and June 30, 1977, the editors received 118 manuscripts of articles. At the end of the period 12 had been accepted for publication, 87 had been rejected, and 19 were still being processed. Volume XXXVII (1977), exclusive of the *Tasks* (March) issue, carried 21 regular articles, 2 comments, and 6 review articles. As before, the editors are sometimes obliged to reject potentially publishable articles for lack of space.

The ICPSR is a cooperative and interdisciplinary organization which facilitates research and instruction in the social sciences by providing (1) a central repository and dissemination service for computer-readable social science data, (2) training facilities in basic and advanced methods of quantitative analysis, and (3) resources for facilitating use of advanced computer technology. The organization is a consortium of over 200 colleges and universities in the United States, Canada, and other nations with a central staff located in the Institute for Social Research of The University of Michigan. Support for the organization is provided by annual subscriptions paid by the affiliated institutions which are supplemented by foundation awards in support of special projects.

The data repository receives, processes and distributes computer-readable data collected by social scientists who have completed initial investigations

and who feel that their data will be of value to others. Current data holdings include both historical and contemporary data files pertinent to over 130 countries and relevant to a variety of areas of specialization in such disciplines as economics, history, political science and sociology.
