A Report on the Congressional Fellowship Program, 1982-83 and 1983-84

Editor's Note: The Winter 1983 issue of PS reported on the 1981-82 Congressional Fellowship Program and on the first half of the 1982-83 Program. The following completes that report, and provides information on the 1983-84 Program.

The Congressional Fellowship Program is a professional level internship program that places academics, journalists, and federal agency executives on the staffs of senators, congressmen and congressional committees. Its goals are to enhance public understanding of Congress and the policy-making process; provide practical experience in congressional politics to future leaders in higher education, government and the press; and assist Congress by having highly qualified scientists, journalists, lawyers and administrators serve temporarily on personal and committee staffs.

Since the first class of Fellows began in 1953, a total of 1,071 Fellows have participated in the program, including 200 political scientists, 160 journalists, 510 federal executives, 54 medical faculty and 147 other participants.

Each year there are between 40 and 50 Congressional Fellows. The political scientists and journalists, supported entirely by contributions from corporations and foundations, are selected in a nationwide competition among political scientists who have completed their doctorate within the last ten years or are near completion, and among reporters with a bachelor's degree and between two and ten years of professional experience in newspaper, magazine, radio or television reporting. Criteria for selection are quality training, demonstrated competence, maturity and responsibility, relevance of fellowship experience to career goals, and potential for advancement.

The majority of Fellows participate in the Program through affiliate arrangements, including:

- federal executives (Grades 13-16) supported by agency training funds;
- Asian Fellows supported by the Asia Foundation;
- Harkness Fellows supported by the Commonwealth Fund;

- Health Policy Fellows, including medical faculty, supported by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation;
- anthropology faculty supported by the American Anthropological Association;
- West German Fellows supported by the German Marshall Fund;
- Carl Albert Fellows supported by the Carl Albert Center at the University of Oklahoma.

Financial support for the political scientists and journalists is provided by the Andreas Foundation, AT&T, Exxon Education Foundation, IBM, Field Enterprises Charitable Corporation, Gannett Foundation, and the Poynter Fund.

This year's program was directed by Catherine E. Rudder and Nancy McManus, assistant director of the program. An Advisory Committee, whose members are listed below, provides overall policy guidance for the program.

The program commences in early November with an orientation period that includes seminars with numerous legislators, administrators, lobbyists, reporters and scholars covering a range of topics relating to Congress and national politics. During this time Fellows also begin exploring individual office assignments. Negotiations are conducted by the individual participants with congressional offices of their choice. Fellows begin work in their House or Senate offices by December. They serve in each house for approximately four and a half months. A continuing series of seminars are scheduled during the entire year to supplement the internship experience. Fellows also travel with their representative or senator to the congressional district or state during the course of the year.
