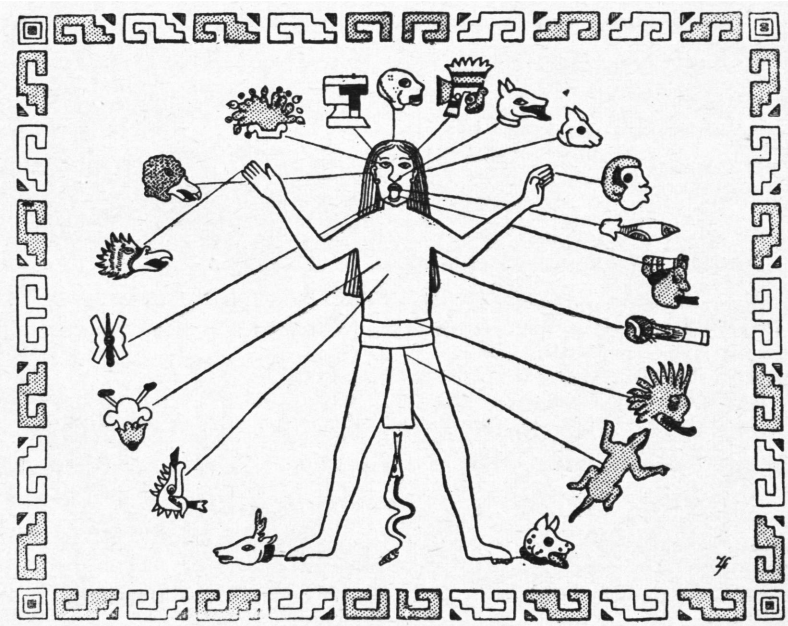

The early inhabitants of Mexico had twenty astrological signs, to each of which were allotted thirteen days; these signs were supposed to govern the human body in health and disease.
