

RETHINKING COLD WAR HISTORY

By JOHN LEWIS GADDIS

In this monograph, based on the third annual Klaus Knorr Memorial Lecture, Professor Gaddis considers how the end of the Cold War and the sudden increase in the availability of archival materials from the former Soviet Union, Eastern Europe, and China are transforming the ways in which historians understand the events of the past half century. Gaddis notes that, despite the tendency of many Western scholars to downplay its importance, the new sources make clear the central role of ideology in determining the behavior of Communist leaders. Reexamining a number of incidents from the early years of the Cold War in both Europe and Asia, Gaddis concludes that "there were certain actions on the part of Communist leaders . . . that made no sense at all except in ideological terms." Moreover, he suggests, several later developments (including Soviet expansionism in Africa in the 1970s) may be explicable in part as "a kind of geriatric overexertion: the attempts of old revolutionaries, for reasons more sentimental than rational, to rediscover their roots." This is a provocative introduction to the "new" history of the Cold War.
