INFORMATION FOR CONTRIBUTORS TO ANIMAL PRODUCTION

Animal Production publishes papers on original research provided that they have not been, and will not be, published elsewhere in whole, or in part, without the Editors' written permission. Contributions may be in the field of animal production, or in any related scientific field. Papers presented at meetings of the British Society of Animal Production, if submitted to the Editors, will be given equal consideration with other papers.

Animal Production is published not less than twice a year, each number consisting of about 96 pages. Annual subscription for every 2 numbers is 30s. (or \$5.00 in the U.S.A. and Canada) and the price for a single number is 17s. 6d. (or \$2.75).

Length of papers should not normally exceed the equivalent of 6,000 words, inclusive of tables, text figures and references.

Manuscripts should be typed in double spacing and the ribbon copy sent to one of the Editors at the addresses given below. Manuscripts are not returned with the proofs; authors should therefore retain copies.

Illustrations (figures and plates) should be simple and few, otherwise a charge may have to be made to authors. Legends should be typed on a separate sheet.

- (a) Diagrams should be drawn in Indian ink, about twice the size of the finished block, on Bristol board or stout tracing paper. Photographed diagrams are also accepted. Lettering inside the framework of the diagram should be inserted in Indian ink. Marginal lettering may, if preferred, be inserted lightly in pencil. Costs of touching-up diagrams found to be incomplete or unsuitable for line-block reproduction will be charged to authors.
- (b) Photographs intended for half-tone reproduction should be on glossy paper. They will be accepted only if found necessary by the Editors. Part of their cost may have to be borne by authors.
- (c) Colour plates will not be accepted unless the author bears the cost.



CYANOPHYTA by T. V. Desikachary

This monograph offers up-to-date taxonomic and morphological information on blue-green algae of India and neighbouring countries. It is divided into two parts. Part I deals with the structure of the cell, its contents, the methods of propagation and a discussion on classification and phylogeny. Part II gives the taxonomic description of each genus and species, their delimitation, and keys to genera and species.

This monograph deals with the species and genera of Zygnemaceae recorded from the different countries of the world. A review of the world literature with special reference to contributions made by India is followed by a general account of the family including a discussion on its classification, evolution and relationship. Full information on the geographical distribution of the family and its general is also given. A major part of the monograph is devoted to a taxonomic description. Keys to genera and species are simple and well-illustrated. Standard works and references given at the end of the book would be found highly useful by students and specialists alike.
