The annual institutional subscription rate for the Journal (including the Bibliography of Asian Studies) is \$60, postage included. Single issues of the Journal and Bibliography published after February 1966 are available through the Secretariat of the Association. Issues published prior to 1966 may be purchased from A.M.S. Reprints, 56 E. 13th Street, New York, New York 10003.

Membership in the Association for Asian Studies, a scholarly, non-political and non-profit organization, is open to all persons interested in Asia and the scholarly study of Asia. Annual membership dues are \$25 for Regular members, \$12.50 for Retired members, and \$12.50 for Student members. Student membership is restricted to full-time students for a maximum of five years.

Regular, Retired, and Student members receive the Journal of Asian Studies and the Asian Studies Newsletter.

Manuscripts for publication should be submitted to Professor Joyce K. Kallgren, Editor, Journal of Asian Studies, 12 Barrows Hall, University of California, Berkeley, California 94720. Manuscripts should be typed on 8 $1/2 \times 11$ bond, double-spaced. Footnotes should be in the form recommended in A Manual of Style, 12th ed. (Chicago: Univ. of Chicago Press, 1969), typed double-spaced, and placed at the end of the manuscript. Manuscripts, including footnotes, should not be more than 50 pages in length; the original and two clear copies should be submitted.
