The Centre for African Studies, School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS), has announced that Christopher Cramer has become the new Chair of the Centre. Dr Cramer teaches at the Department of Development Studies at SOAS, and his research interests include rural labour markets, and the countries Mozambique, South Africa and Ethiopia.

AWARDS & PRIZES

Noma Award for Publishing in Africa

The 2005 winner of the Noma award has been announced as: La mémoire amputée, Werewere-Liking, pub Nouvelles Editions Ivoiriennes, Adidjan, 2004. The Noma jury described the book as, 'a truly remarkable achievement, illustrating the potential of African literature to renew and regenerate its forms ... this is a deeply felt presentation of the female condition in Africa; and a celebration of women as the country's memory, and feminine patriotism and wisdom as central to the question for the self-determination of Africa'. The award will be presented during the first Cape Town Book Fair, 17-20 June 2006.

Africa Online Digital Library

The online digital library encourages individuals and organisations to build up and publish digital and/or digitised collections for public access. The Africa Online Digital Library has been developed by MATRIX (the Centre for Humane Arts, Letters, and Social Sciences Online, Michigan State University), working in cooperation with the Africa Studies Centre at the same institution. The website includes documents on best practice and standards in creating online content, alongside galleries already created. This resource has been running for some time, and collections are generally extensive collections of photographs, although there are also some audio interviews, and text-based resources. So far, the content largely relates to West Africa in general, and Senegal in particular. Galleries include photographs from Phil Curtin's fieldwork; images from L'Institut Fondemental d'Afrique Noire (IFAN), Dakar; an exhibition on Sufi arts in Senegal; and documents on the history of the Futa Jalon.

Recent messages on the H-Africa net discussion list have suggested using this resource to build up historical maps of Africa.

Hans Zell has very kindly allowed us to reproduce his note on the relevance of Wikipedia for Africa studies. This has been a resource that has been growing in profile and size (and diversity of opinion on its usefulness). Terry Barringer, editor of ARD, is planning to write a longer piece on this theme, and would be grateful for any comments on its usefulness to researchers and students. Contact details for Terry Barringer can be found on the inside front cover of this journal.

"Wikipedia is a searchable free-content encyclopedia that anyone can edit. It was started in 2001, and currently (August 2005) contains almost 700,000 articles. Articles are written collaboratively by many of its readers and users. "Free content" is considered to be "any kind of functional work, artwork, or other creative content upon which no legal restriction has been placed that significantly interferes with people's freedom to use, understand, redistribute, improve, and share the content." Anyone can edit or "improve" entries in the encyclopedia, and there are hundreds of hourly changes all of which are recorded on the page history for each entry, including the pages relating to Africa and African topics. Click on to "Discussion" for any entry to follow comments and debates about the evolving content on any page. From the main Africa pages you can access quite substantial articles, a well as summaries about geography, history, politics, demographics, languages, culture, religion, and other topics, for example entries on colonialism, the slave trade, human rights, AIDS, ethnic groups, language groups, etc. as well as a fairly substantial number of entries for African authors, with extensively cross-linked biographical profiles. However, irritatingly, some of these are in fact blind entries indicating, for example, "Wikipedia does not yet have a page called Ayi Kwei Armah." There are also pages for each country in Africa, which on the whole seem to be well compiled, fairly accurate, and up-to-date. However, the external links section for both the main Africa and individual country pages are poor for the most part. Wikipedia is an innovative and exciting concept in freely accessible online resources, but the information it offers for some entries - which can be simplistic, uninformed, inadequately documented, contentious, or anarchistic! - must be used with caution." The new edition contains 1000 new entries, to include coverage of African kingdoms, and expand information on the African diaspora in Latin America and the Caribbean.

The African Studies Association of Australasia and the Pacific was formed in 1978 and published its first directory in the following year. This sixth edition contains over 300 entries, mostly university academics but also ambassadors and High Commissioners, officials, NGO workers, businessmen and one librarian (Peter Limb, albeit now based in Michigan, who will need no introduction to ARD readers).

The entries vary from the basic to the very full. In addition to the usual post/phone/email information, they may have details of African experience, Current research, "Other African related activities" (The Secretary of AFSAAP and compiler of this directory is revealed as a "DJ on public radio") and publications. The list of publications may be very lengthy (two runs to 5½ pages each) but some of the most distinguished scholars have some of the shortest entries.

There are indices by Place of Residence (over 40 are based outside Australasia/Pacific), Regional Specialisation and by Disciplinary Specialisation. There is a list of Ambassadors, High Commissioners, Consular officials and another of Non-Government Organisations.

Lesotho

The Summary of events in Lesotho, Vol. 12 Pt 3, 2005, (compiled by David Ambrose) contains several reports of interest on libraries and archives. The first concerns the dispersal of books following the closure of the British High Commission in Maseru. Books from the library were distributed amongst the Thomas Mofolo Library of the National University of Lesotho, Morija Museum and Archives, National Library, Sechaba Consultants Library, and the Transformation Resource Centre Library. The books included several rare and valuable items, which had formed part of the Basutoland Public Library. There is also a report on a project being developed to catalogue, and rehouse in archival storage boxes, the Leribe Collection. This is an extensive collection relating to administraion of the Leribe district over a 75 year period from 1876. The Library at the National University is expected to expand as part of a rebuilding programme started in July 2005. It is not clear yet though whether there will be funding to complete the project.

The 50th anniversary of Morija Museum and Archives is being commemorated by a new publication, *The story of the Morija Museum and Archives*, wriiten by the curator, Stephen Gill.
