## 1. Opening of the Session

Following the Inaugural Ceremony, the President opened the meeting and welcomed Members to the first working session of the General Assembly.

## 2. Appointment of Official Interpreters

Drs. Thierry Courvoisier (English-French) and Janet Rountree (French-English) had agreed to serve as Official Interpreters. Their election was approved by acclamation.

## 3. Appointment of Official Tellers

Drs. Martin Ward, Jean-Pierre Swings and Patricia Whitelock had agreed to serve as Official Tellers. Their election was approved by acclamation.

## 4. Report of the Executive Committee 1994-1997

The General Secretary briefly presented the Report of the Executive Committee 1994-1997. The main issues and decisions are summarised as follows:

- The implementation of the new Division structure of the IAU following the proposal adopted by the XXIInd General Assembly in The Hague;
- Revision of the IAU Statutes, Bye-Laws and Working Rules to accommodate the Division structure;
- Modification of the Statutes and Bye-Laws to accommodate the individual membership of astronomers not represented by a national adhering organisation;
- Introduction of the Teaching of Astronomy Development (TAD) Programme;
- Establishment of a new Working Group for Future Large Scale Facilities;
- Conclusion of a new IAU Publishing Contract for the years 1998-2003;
- The use of the World Wide Web as a new major means of communication within the Union.

*(a) On questions concerning the administration of the union, not involving its budget, voting at the General Assembly is by Adhering Country, each country having one vote. Adhering Countries which have not paid their annual contributions up to 31 December of the year preceding the General Assembly may not participate in the voting.
*(b) On questions involving the budget of the Union, voting is similarly by Adhering Country, under the same conditions and with the same reservations as in (a), the number of votes for each Adhering Country being one greater than the number of its category.

## 11. Financial matters

## REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE OF THE IAU, BY D.C. MORTON, CHAIR

The Finance Committee had appointed a subcommittee to examine the accounts and proposed budget of the IAU and prepare a draft report for presentation to the General Assembly. The subcommittee was composed of D. C. Morton (Canada), Chair, A. Boksenberg (U.K.), G. Bruzual (Venezuela), S. Ikeuchi (Japan), and R. Milkey (USA). The report by the Finance Sub-Committee, as approved by the full Finance Committee, is reproduced in the following:

Prior Years: The Finance Committee reviewed the accounts for 1994, 1995, and 1996 as well as the audit reports for these years, and is pleased to report that the funds were used responsibly in accordance with the budget and policies adopted by the $22^{\text {nd }}$ General Assembly.

For the current year, 1997, the Committee found that both the income and expenditures are on track to meet the budget approved by the $22^{\text {nd }}$ General Assembly, and that no revisions are indicated.

Budget for the Triennium 1998-2000: The Finance Committee examined the assumptions used to construct the budget for the period 1998 through 2000, as published in IAU Bulletin No. 80, and found that these are reasonable and relatively conservative. We note that a substantial deficit is planned for this period, and we offer some suggestions to assist in controlling this deficit. In particular, we are concerned that in the proposed budget the reserves at the end of 2000 will only be at a level of approximately $85 \%$ of the expected operating budget for the following year. In the following sections, we address the specific items of the budget.
A. Income: The assumption for annual inflation rates for the Unit of Contribution is appropriate and consistent with the best information currently available. These rates, quoted below, are intended to result in a Unit that is constant in real terms.

We caution, however, that when future budgets are constructed the IAU must consider that the science budgets in many countries are not growing at a rate to compensate for inflation and therefore the increases in the contribution may come at the expense of other scientific programs.

1. Adhering Organizations: The budget is based on the current categories of adherence by members and the assumption that all members will pay dues as assessed. This is a reasonable approach to budgeting; however the General Secretary must continue to track any shortfall and be prepared to take compensating action on the expense side of the ledger, if required.
2. Special Contributions: The budget assumes no income from special contributions. This is a very conservative approach, but reasonable in view of the fact that there is no guarantee of such income. We do
note, however that contributions at a level of $176,300 \mathrm{CHF}$ were received in 1991-93 and 208,730 CHF in 1994-96. The IAU should make every effort to maintain the special contributions at a level consistent with past experience.
3. Publications: Income from royalties on IAU publications has been reduced in the new publishing contract, consistently with the goal of reducing the cost of IAU publications to libraries. While it would be unwise to depend on a growth in circulation to offset the reductions in income per volume, it should certainly be the goal to increase the circulation with more modestly priced volumes, and the publisher should be encouraged to market these aggressively. Any additional income so realized should be used to reduce the deficit.

## B. Expenses: The specific categories of expense are discussed below.

1. Scientific Activities: The last triennium saw an increase in expenditures for scientific activities by approximately $27 \%$ over the period $1991-93$. This was a response to a recommendation of the Finance Committee and clearly had a beneficial effect for the IAU as a whole. The budget for the next triennium forecasts a growth of yet another $10 \%$, primarily for travel grants for Symposia and Colloquia. While continued growth of these activities will have a positive effect on the conduct of astronomical research, it must be moderated after consideration of the forecast of available income. In particular, we recommend that the Executive Committee consider the financial aspects when determining how many and which Symposia and Colloquia to support, and apply the highest scientific standards in the selection of these and the level of support to be provided.
2. Dues to Unions and Organizations: The amount forecast in the budget appears adequate to meet the obligations of the IAU to such organizations.
3. Executive Committee: The amount budgeted is reasonable. However, the Committee and the General Secretary should continue to minimize the costs of this activity, consistently with accomplishing the necessary business of the IAU, and any funds so realized should be applied toward reduction of the deficit.
4. Publication Costs: The forecast budget reflects reduced costs resulting from the change of publishers and is judged to be adequate to continue the Information Bulletins and free distribution programmes at an appropriate level. The General Secretary is encouraged to investigate the options for the use of electronic distribution to reduce the mailing costs and to accelerate the flow of information to the membership. The option for mail distribution must be retained to assure that we do not cut off those members who do not have reliable electronic access.
5. Administration/Secretariat: There is minimal growth in expenditures in this area and we wish to express our satisfaction with the efficiency of operations of this office. It has been possible to provide salary increases consistent with inflation, without having a similar overall growth in expense in this category.
C. Reserve Funds: The IAU policy has been to maintain a reserve equivalent to one-year's operating budget. We anticipate ending 1997 with a reserve that is approximately $110 \%$ of projected budget for 1998 , but with the level of deficit in this budget we will end 2000 with reserve funds equal to only about $85 \%$ of the budget extrapolated for 2001. We feel that it is necessary for the General Secretary to adopt an aggressive approach to attempt to reduce this deficit by about $100,000 \mathrm{CHF}$ and to restore the reserves as desired by the policy of the Executive Committee. Special contributions could be an important element in achieving the desired programme content without unduly depleting the reserves.

Although the interpretation of the reserve policy as requiring a balance equivalent to the operating level of a year in which a General Assembly does not occur is acceptable for this budget, we would be more comfortable with a level equal to the average of a triennium's expenses. We note that due to variations in timing of receipts from adhering organizations and payment of expenses, the cash flow during any given year may temporarily draw the bank accounts well below the balance at the beginning of the year, so that the General Secretary must assure that the IAU has the resources to deal with such situations in a flexible manner.
D. Budgeting for the Period 2001-2003: It is essential that the IAU return to a balanced budget for this period and restore a stable reserve equivalent to an annual operating budget, averaged over three years. This may require either a reduction of expenditures, increase in revenues, or a combination of both.

Special Support: The Finance Committee notes with gratitude the special contributions by ESA, ESO, and NASA in 1997 for travel grants for the $23^{\text {rd }}$ General Assembly. The Finance Committee also recognizes the
important indirect financial contributions of the Institut National des Sciences de l'Univers of CNRS by providing office space in Paris for the Secretariat, and of Landessternwarte Heidelberg-Königsstuhl and Copenhagen University for the time which the General Secretary and the Assistant General Secretary, respectively, spend on IAU affairs.

Contribution Levels: The IAU differs from other international unions in its substantial support of scientific meetings, publications, and related activities which directly benefit its individual members worldwide. It is important for the membership to understand that for these reasons the IAU requests significantly higher contribution levels from the adhering agencies than do other unions.

Treasurer's Report and Financial Advice: The Finance Committee received a useful report (see following paragraph) from the Treasurer of the IAU, a position which the Executive Committee created at the recommendation of a previous Finance Committee. It is appropriate for the Executive Committee to assess the need for continuing this position and to define the duties and appointment procedure or eliminate the position.

The Finance Committee recommends that the Executive Committee adopt procedures in which a standing Finance Sub-Committee is consulted formally in the preparation of the budget for each triennium and that there is some continuity with the membership of the next Finance Subcommittee.

## TREASURER'S REPORT, BY MORTON S. ROBERTS, JULY 30, 1997

The annual expenditures of the Union over the six year period 1991-1996 averaged $8.0 \times 10^{5} \mathrm{CHF}$, the annual income over this same period averaged $8.1 \times 10^{5} \mathrm{CHF}$, i.e., close to steady state. The projection for the four year period 1997-2000 is less encouraging.
$\begin{array}{ll}\text { Average Annual Expenditures } & 9.4 \times 10^{5} \mathrm{CHF} / \text { year } \\ \text { Average Annual Income } & 8.4 \times 10^{5} \mathrm{CHF} / \text { year }\end{array}$
Note however that the figure for Income does not include "Special Contributions" which by their nature cannot be forecast. In the period 1991-1996 they averaged $0.6 \times 10^{5} \mathrm{CHF} /$ year. If such special contributions continue into the future, the projected average annual deficit will be significantly reduced. That this may well happen is indicated by the generous subventions made in 1997 by ESA, ESO, and NASA for travel grants to the Kyoto General Assembly.

The reserves of the Union are $1 \times 10^{6}$ CHF so that this projected deficit can be handled. However, as the Finance Committee has noted in the past, a million Swiss Francs is a prudent reserve. It is an amount close to one year's operation and should be maintained near this value. Some 88 percent of the Union's income originates from contributions by Adhering Organizations. This average percentage includes a modest increase of two to three percent per year for inflation.

Close to 60 percent of the Union's expenditures are for Scientific Activities. These are detailed in the budget document and include the General Assembly, support for Symposia, Colloquia, and Regional Meetings. Various working groups and commission activities are also supported as is the Exchange of Astronomers programme.

Dues to other Unions and Organizations are more than compensated by the annual ICSU contribution. The remaining third of the budget is attributable to (1) expenses incurred by officers of the Union, (2) publications, and (3) the Administration/Secretariat office.

The Union is growing in membership and in the activities it supports. It is doing this with a modest increase in budgetary outlay. In one specific instance it has purposefully reduced its expected income by lessening the royalties from the sale of Symposia volumes to lower their cost to libraries and to individuals.

The proposed budget for the coming triennium is well thought out and looks to a successful entry for the IAU into the next millennium. Our General Secretary, Immo Appenzeller, is to be complimented on a task well done.
The President thanked the Chairman of the Finance Sub-Committee and the Treasurer for their reports and asked the National Representatives to vote on the proposed budget for 1998-2000.

## APPROVAL OF BUDGET FOR 1998-2000

The proposed budget was approved.
