angles the sines of which when multiplied by the cosine of the angle abreast of it in the extreme left-hand column give the product to be found at the top of the column.

The arrangement of the table is ingenious; and, with but little practice, it may be used with ease. The author describes two ways of using the table; but it is significant that he makes no reference to a position line, which is the essential feature of every astro-navigational problem.
