The American Farmer and the New Deal Theodore Saloutos

The American Farmer and the New Deal surveys and analyzes government policy as related to agriculture during the bold, imaginative, yet troubled years of the New Deal.

Author Theodore Saloutos, developing a broad picture of the American farmer during these troubled years, shows how the innovative programs of the New Deal were handicapped by sharp divisions in the United States Department of Agriculture as well as by personal rivalries within agencies. He examines conditions over which New Deal administrators had little or no control; foreign competition and drought; the political defeats of 1938; the resort to political expediency; the growing reaction to reform; and the mounting concern with national defense.

Other topics include the state of agriculture after World War I, the quest for a farm policy in the years prior to the New Deal, the struggle to have the domestic allotment proposal accepted, and the staffing of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

In other chapters Saloutos discusses the launching of the various commodity programs, the battle for the disinherited (sharecroppers and tenants), rural resettlement, and the Farm Security Administration. He also reviews the effort to re-establish the foreign market for farm products, programs for the black farmer, the New Deal in the Great Plains, rural electrification, and the election of 1936.

The American Farmer and the New Deal emphasizes the nature of the farmers' economic difficulties, the means employed to resolve them, and the obstacles encountered. This is the first general overall treatment of agriculture by an historian covering the years 1933 to 1939.

This is the first book in the Henry A. Wallace Series on Agricultural History and Rural Studies. This series focuses on agricultural history and will encompass the social, intellectual, scientific, technological, economic, and political aspects of agricultural history.
