The Secretary's Annual Report 1966

THE Society's main conservation effort in 1966 was made through the Revolving Fund, set up jointly with the World Wildlife Fund in December, 1965. The Fund revolved once completely, and with an outlay of rather less than £2,000 from the Society's own funds, succeeded in channeling more than £9,000 to urgent conservation projects. The Fund attracted a magnificent donation of £2,500 from an anonymous member, and smaller donations from other members totalling £313. In addition the World Wildlife Fund repaid £7,054 into the Fund under the agreement made when it was set up. The four WWF Projects aided were those designed to save the Javan rhino, the Sumatran rhino and the Persian fallow deer, and the provision of an aircraft to enable the Zambian Game Department to control poaching. Fuller details of the working of the Revolving Fund in its first year will be found in ORYX, December 1966, Vol. VIII, pp. 339-40.

An additional grant made by the Society during the year was one of £250 to enable Dr. Kai Curry-Lindahl, the eminent Swedish conservationist, to undertake a mission in the Congo on behalf of the International Union for Conservation of Nature, a report of which will be found in ORYX, August 1966, Vol. VIII, pp. 293-94.

Donations and Consultants

The Society is particularly indebted to those members who made generous donations to the Society's general funds, and especially to Mr. Ernest Kleinwort, who gave £150, and to Mrs. P. B. Tillyard, who gave £100, and to the following members who made donations of between £25 and £50: Miss Hilda Bennett, Misses Josephine and Rosemary Burton (proceeds of gymkhana), Miss Frances Glendinning (proceeds of bring-and-buy sale), Mrs. Holtby (in memory of Major Audus), Mr. Llewellin-Taylour, Mr. B. H. C. Thomas and the Hon. Patrick Wills.

During the year Council decided to set up a panel of Overseas Consultants and Correspondents, to keep the Society and its journal ORYX in touch with events in countries overseas. A preliminary list of the names of the distinguished conservationists who have accepted Council's invitation appears on pages 14 and 15.

Arabian Oryx Herd

The Society's share of the World Herd of Arabian Oryx at Phoenix Zoo, Arizona, increased by one, as the result of the birth of three more calves in August and September, one of which was the long awaited first female calf. The Society now owns seven oryxes, three adults and one female and three male calves, out of a total of 16 in the herd.

East African Tours

In late January the first of the Society's highly successful Oryx Tours took place. Two parties totalling 45 members, led by our Vice-President, Captain Pitman, and the Hon. Secretary, assisted by the Editor and Mr. John Wightman, visited Lake Naivasha, Lake Nakuru, Treetops, the Mara Game Reserve and Tsavo West National Park in Kenya, and the Ngorongoro Crater and the Serengeti, Lake Manyara and Ngurdoto Crater National Parks in Tanzania. A reunion meeting of members who had been on the two tours was held in London in September.

British Mammals

During the year the Society continued its close interest in the conservation of British mammals, through its participation in the Working Party set up to produce a booklet on the control of mammal predators, to be published in 1967, and by taking part in preliminary discussions on new legislation to conserve the stocks of British seals, and on methods of stopping the needless slaughter of badgers without recourse to legislation.

International Meetings

The Hon. Secretary attended three international gatherings during the year, two of them on behalf of the Society and the third at the invitation of the San Diego Zoo. These were a meeting in Washington, D.C., in April of the Steering Committee appointed at the London meeting in September, 1965, to prepare the ground for the proposed intergovernmental conference on wildlife conservation; the General Assembly of IUCN in Lucerne in June; and the celebrations of the 50th anniversary of the San Diego Zoo at San Diego, California, in October. The Editor also attended the IUCN Lucerne conference. In addition the Hon. Secretary attended three routine meetings of the Survival Service Commission, at Morges in March, at Lucerne in June and at San Diego in October.

Field and Indoor Meetings

Two field meetings were held in England, at Stansted Wildlife Reserve, Essex, by invitation of Mr. Aubrey Buxton, and at Mole Hall with Mrs. P. Johnstone on June 4, and in the New Forest, Hampshire, on October 21/22, when members were entertained to lunch by Sir Dudley Forwood, and Mr. Eric Ashby showed some of his excellent films of wildlife in the Forest. To Mr. Buxton, Mrs. Johnstone, Sir Dudley and Mr. Ashby, the Society is most grateful.

At the Annual General Meeting on May 11, the Hon. Secretary described his travels, mainly on behalf of the Society, during the previous twelve months, under the title of "A Year for Conservation," illustrated by slides. There were six general meetings: on January 20, recent additions to the film library were shown; on March 15 Dr. J. Morton Boyd on Research and Management in East African Wildlife;

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on September 13, Colonel Mervyn Cowie with Sir Malin Sorsbie's film "Escape to Samburu"; on September 20, Mr. Roger Wheater on Management Problems in Uganda National Parks; on October 27, Dr. David Harrison on the Status and Conservation of the Larger Mammals in Arabia; and on December 1, Mr. James Hancock on the Everglades National Park in Florida.

Film Library and Oryx

The Society's film library continued to be extensively used by members and others; 150 films were issued during the year. Four new films were added to the library: "Escape to Samburu" kindly presented by the Munitalp Foundation, "Lake Wilderness" and "To Catch a Rhino," kindly presented by the South African Tourist Corporation, and "The Swallowtail Butterfly" purchased.

The usual three issues of ORYX were published, covering a wide range of subjects—dugongs, elephants, turtles, thylacines, rhinos and Przewalski's horses were some of them—in all parts of the world, including Malaya, Sudan, Antarctica, Tasmania, Peru, Israel, Mongolia and the North Atlantic.

Christmas Cards

The Christmas card sales were most successful, and the Society was once more indebted to Mr. David Shepherd for making available one of his superb paintings, of a puku, for its colour Christmas card, and to Mr. Maurice Wilson for his striking picture of orang-utans for the black-and-white card. Total card sales were 24,620, including 16,620 pukus, 3,000 orang-utans and all cards remaining from the previous year. Sales of ties were well maintained, with a new colour, green, available, and we are much indebted to the British National Appeal of the World Wildlife Fund for making it possible to sell on the Society's behalf 63 of their attractive coffee trays.

Membership

During the year 182 new members joined the Society, and as a result membership of the Society increased by 84. As a result of a recount of the cards, the Society's membership now proves to be 2,354, made up as follows: ordinary members 1,834, life members 492, honorary members 28.

The Society wishes to record once again its cordial thanks to the Zoological Society of London for providing office accommodation.

Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1966

We have completed the audit of the Books and Accounts of the Society for the year ended 31st December, 1966, and report thereon as follows:

The balance on this account at the end of the year was £86 13s, 2d,, after transferring £60 from the Life Membership Fund and deducting £600 7s. 11d., being the excess of Expenditure over Income on the year's working.

The total donations received, amounting to $\pm 1,216$ 6s. 8d. have been credited to this account. In order to show a more realistic figure for subscriptions, amounts paid by Members in excess of the subscriptions prescribed in the Rules of Society have this year been included under donations.

In the previous year there was an excess of Expenditure over Income of $\pounds719$ 0s. 1d.

General Reserve Fund

The balance on this Fund at the 31st December, 1966, was $\pounds 6,414$ 14s. 11d. after adding a legacy received for $\pounds 799$ 6s. 11d., transferring $\pounds 1,997$ 8s. 6d. to the Revolving Fund and deducting $\pounds 677$ 6s. 0d., being the loss on sale of investments.

Life Membership Fund

The balance standing to the credit of the Fund is now £8,230. This is after crediting £790 in respect of Life Membership Subscriptions received during the year and transferring £60 to the General Purposes Account which represents the value of subscriptions of those Life Members whose membership ceased during the year.

Revolving Fund

A transfer of £1,997 8s. 6d. was made to this Fund from General Reserve Fund which, together with donations and other income amounting to £9,975 10s. 3d. produced total receipts of £11,972 18s. 9d. Grants of £9,105 were made on various projects, leaving a balance at 31st December of £2,867 18s. 9d.

Investments

The total investments at 31st December, 1966, at cost amounted to $\pounds 12,338$ 19s. 11d. and the market value at that date was $\pounds 12,144$ 18s. 10d., showing a net depreciation of $\pounds 194$ 1s. 1d.

Surplus

The surplus of Assets over Liabilities at the end of the year amounted to $\pm 14,731$ 8s. 1d., as compared with $\pm 16,417$ 3s. 7d. at the end of the previous year. (Signed) W. B. KEEN & Co.,
