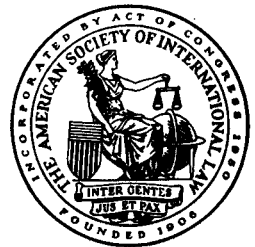

Professor Alexandersson has carefully drawn the physical-hydrographic elements of the Baltic Sea and its approaches; he has vividly described the historical interests, both politically and economically, of the littoral states, analysed the legal status and uses of the Baltic Straits over time, and calculated the role of the Baltic region, with its waterways, in the global struggle between the western alliance and the Soviet bloc. He has especially delineated the delicate role of Sweden and Finland, caught between East and West. Of particular value is his description of the various legal views of the Baltic Straits, particularly in light of the emerging law of the sea and his estimate of the opportunities for peace and prosperity in this region, marked for trade, environmental cooperation, and political rivalries by different systems of political economy.

THE RED SEA AND THE GULF OF ADEN

The author analyzes the legal regime of the bodies of water in this area taking into account customary law and a number of bilateral treaties. The Strait of Bab al-Mandeb has been subjected to a complete analysis to ascertain its legal regime, reflecting customary and conventional law and the merging regime under the Third UN Conference on the Law of the Sea. Thereafter, the Suez Canal has been described with special reference to its commercial and military importance as well as its legal regime. Finally Dr. Lapidoth deals with the Strait of Gubal, the Strait of Tiran and the Gulf of Aqaba.
