WHOLE-TIME COURSES FOR POSTGRADUATE STUDENTS

February 17th-May 22nd, 1964 and August 10th-November 13th, 1964. Basic Sciences Class for Part I D.L.O. students.

This consists of approximately 50 lecture/demonstrations on the anatomy of the head, neck, thorax and brain; 20 lectures covering the physiological aspects; 6 on applied pharmacology; and 8 on histological and pathological and bacteriological subjects. Facilities are also available for dissection of the relevant parts, and this occupies about 120 hours.

January 6th-February 15th, 1964 and June 29th-August 8th, 1964.

Intensive Clinical Lecture Period for Part II D.L.O. and other students. These periods are primarily designed to give a clinical survey of the whole field of the Specialty as a preliminary to practical clinical training. At the completion of the Intensive Lecture Period, selected students may be given the opportunity to serve as house surgeons in the associated hospitals.

June 1st-13th, 1964 and November 11th-24th, 1964

Practical Revision Class for Part II D.L.O. students.
