THE CONTRIBUTORS

MORTON A. KAPLAN, Professor of Political Science and Chairman of the Committee on International Relations at the University of Chicago, in June 1966 presided over an international conference on the new approaches to international relations, held at the University of Chicago. The volume issuing from that conference will be published in late 1967.

RAYMOND DAWSON is Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of North Carolina. He is the author of *The Decision to Aid Russia, 1941: Foreign Policy and Domestic Politics* (1959) and is now at work on a survey of American defense policy.

RICHARD ROSECRANCE, Director of the Security Studies Project and Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of California, Los Angeles, is the author of Action and Reaction in World Politics (1963) and the editor of The Dispersion of Nuclear Weapons (1964). He is now engaged in a study of British postwar defense policy.

WILFRED MALENBAUM is Professor of Economics at the University of Pennsylvania and, in 1966, at the University of Heidelberg. He has written *Prospects for Indian Development* (1962) and his book on differential growth patterns within the Indian economy is scheduled for 1967. His current research is on inequality and development.

ARTHUR L. KALLEBERG is Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Missouri, Columbia. He is making a critical study of pragmatism as a political philosophy and is initiating work on a general theory of democracy.

GABRIELLA ROSNER LANDE, Research Associate of the Center of International Studies at Princeton, is the author of *The United Nations Emergency Force* (1964). Her contribution to this issue reflects her current research on the authority, influence, and legitimacy of the United Nations General Assembly.

MICHAEL HAAS is Assistant Professor of Political Science and Research Associate of the Social Science Research Institute at the University of Hawaii. He is a contributor to the forthcoming volume Quantitative World Politics and is developing three conceptual formulations for a book to be entitled The Empirical Analysis of International Conflict.

P. G. Bock is Staff Editor for Political Science of the International Encyclopedia of the Social Sciences and edited, with Morton Berkowitz, American National Security: A Reader in Theory and Policy (1965).

MORTON BERKOWITZ is Assistant Professor of Political Science at Brooklyn College of the City University of New York and Research Associate of its Institute for Comparative Politics and Administration. He is again collaborating with P. G. Bock on the article on national security for the forthcoming edition of the International Encyclopedia of the Social Sciences.

ARISTIDE R. ZOLBERG, Associate Professor of Political Science and Director of the Center for the Comparative Study of Political Development at the University of Chicago, is the author of One-Party Government in the Ivory Coast (1964) and Creating Political Order: The Party-States of West Africa (1966). He is completing a study of Mali based on field work conducted in 1964.

AMELIA C. Leiss is Assistant to the Director of the Center for International Studies at M.I.T. She is editor and coauthor of the Carnegie Endowment's 1965 analysis Apartheid and the United Nations Collective Measures.
