In Memoriam

Douglas H. Mendel, Jr.

With the death of Professor Douglas Mendel on May 14, 1978, the Department of Political Science at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee lost a valued colleague and the profession lost an outstanding scholar of Far Eastern politics. Originally from New York, Douglas Mendel took his Bachelors of Arts degree, magna cum laude, at Middlebury College, Vermont, in 1942. He then entered upon a tour of duty with the Armed Services that was to influence greatly his professional career. In 1944, he graduated from the U.S. Navy Japanese language school at Boulder, Colorado, and served as an interpreter-translator-interrogator in the Pacific theater until August, 1945. Subsequently, he worked as a civilian employee for the U.S. War Department in Korea, and then returned to the Navy as a reserve officer in the language translation field. In 1949, he began graduate work at the University of Michigan and received a Doctor of Philosophy degree in 1955. Prior to his arrival at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee in 1961, he was an assistant professor at the University of California, Los Angeles.

Utilizing his language skills and drawing upon extensive experience in the Far East, Professor Mendel immediately launched a scholarly career and soon established a distinguished record of research and publication. His first major article was published in the *American Political Science Review* in 1954 and his first book, *The Japanese People and Foreign Policy*, was published by the University of California Press in 1960.
